The Gift of Capturing the Authentic Voices of Teachers

Session Information

Join Karen Yager, Principal of The Hills Grammar School and PhD Candidate as she emphasises the importance of teacher voice and agency within the educational landscape. She will share her PhD study to this point, that adopts a qualitative research methodology, underpinned by insights gained from an initial pilot study. The driving rationale for using qualitative research is the importance of capturing the authentic voices of teachers (Graebner, Martin and Roundy, 2012; Lim, 2024). Thus, the focus is centred on the teacher and whether the perception of teachers is that participation in effective professional learning informed by research-based practices has the propensity to influence a teacher's knowledge, beliefs, attitudes resulting in improved capabilities and pedagogical practices. The theoretical frameworks of self-determination theory (Deci and Ryan, 2009) and Communities of Practice theory (Wenber, 1998) that underpin this research, emphasise the importance of the human at the centre of the lifelong learning experience.

Karen Yager | Principal of Hills Grammar

A progressive and creative leader, Karen brings more than 26 years' experience to our School, most recently as Deputy Headmaster K-12 at Knox Grammar. Her work in the education and academic world has been recognised with numerous awards, including the NSW Professional Teachers Council Award for Outstanding Service to Education in 2019.

With an emphasis on developing each student's unique strengths, agency and voice, Mrs Yager will continue to nurture, grow and inspire our Hills Originals to achieve their potential for greatness.

The Power of Hope for Educators

Session Information

At a time when school leaders face a relentless array of new and enduring challenges, where is hope to be found? This presentation touches on the unfounded assumptions, unhelpful binary distinctions and untested simplistic solutions that dominate the current field of school improvement. It highlights how inspiring hope among educators requires more than blind optimism and wishful thinking. Nurturing hope depends on evidence of genuine change brought about by processes that respect school leaders, teachers, and their work. This argument is illustrated with evidence from rigorous research that puts pedagogy at the centre of educational reform. It demonstrates positive effects on teacher morale and efficacy, teacher collaboration and collegiality, school culture, the quality of teaching and, most importantly, student achievement and equity. Conceptually, hope matters. Practically, it can be realised.

Laureate Professor Jenny Gore AM, FASSA, FAERA | University of Newcastle

Laureate Professor Jenny Gore is Director of the Teachers and Teaching Research Centre at the University of Newcastle. Her research tackles persistent educational challenges through comprehensive programs of research on teacher development, pedagogical reform, enhancing student outcomes, and the formation of student aspirations. Jenny's ongoing work on Quality Teaching and Quality Teaching Rounds, conducted with colleagues over the last decade, has shown how this framework can effectively support teacher professional development, increase teacher satisfaction, enhance teaching quality in schools, and improve student achievement while also narrowing equity gaps. She has been awarded more than \$38 million in research funding and her publications have been cited more than 18,000 times. A recipient of the Paul Brock Memorial Medal in 2018 for outstanding contributions to social justice and evidence-informed policy, practice, and research, Jenny was elected Fellow of the Royal Society of NSW in 2021, recognising NSW leaders in their fields. She has also been recognised by the Australian Council for Deans of Education for outstanding contributions to education reform and as an elected Fellow of the American Educational Research Association for her expertise across diverse research traditions and as a Fellow of The Academy of the Social Sciences in Australia. Jenny was named Australia's leading researcher in 2022 in the field of teaching and teacher education, an award that filters for both quality and impact, and was most recently awarded a Member of the Order of Australia (AM) in the 2024 Australia Day Honours for significant service to tertiary education.

Creativity is Booming! Lessons from a Premier Award Journey

Session Information

Let's celebrate and learn from the creative learning that is happening in our schools – locally and globally.

Dr Geoff Gates, winner of The NSW 2025 Premier Award for Education, shares insights from a global study tour exploring how schools and universities cultivate creativity across disciplines. Funded by the NSW Premier's Creativity Across the Curriculum Scholarship, the research spans twelve schools, four universities, and the OECD, highlighting five key approaches: Connected Curriculum, Creative Leadership, Pedagogies for Creativity, Deep Disciplinary Knowledge, and Learning Labs.

Dr Geoff Gates | Director of Learning and Teaching of Hills Grammar

As the Director of Learning and Teaching Pre K to 12, Geoff works closely with the Heads of ECEC, Junior School and Senior School, to ensure a high quality curriculum is in place across the School. He also works closely with both curriculum leaders and teachers on projects such as Cultures of Thinking and Deep Learning, where the aim is to develop innovative, 21st century approaches to learning and teaching.

Geoff started teaching at Hills Grammar in 2004. Prior to Hills, he worked in Sydney, London and Hamburg and has taught HSC, GCSE, IGCSE and IB Diploma courses. His past leadership roles have included Literacy Coordinator, Student Services Coordinator, and Head of English. Geoff has presented at education and university conferences on pedagogy, literature and creative writing practice.

Geoff completed a Master of Arts (Creative Writing) in 2007, and a Master of Education (Leadership) in 2013 and a Doctor of Creative Arts degree in 2023. He is the author of two novels, and has written for both professional publications and literary journals. Geoff completed the AIS Flagship Leadership Program in 2023 and awarded a Premier's Teacher Scholarship for 2025 (Creativity Across the Curriculum).

AI, Integrity and Innovation: Positive Pathways for Teaching and Learning

Session Information

Since the emergence of Generative Artificial Intelligence (GenAI) in late 2022, educators have faced a critical choice: view it as a threat to be managed or embrace it as a powerful tool to be leveraged.

In this session, Dr Beth Chapman from the University of Canberra's Faculty of Education and Ryan Elwell, Director of Digital Pedagogies and Online Safety Education at the ACT Education Directorate, invite participants to explore how schools and systems can position themselves to make the most of AI's potential while navigating its challenges.

Beth's research highlights the significant issues of academic integrity, ethics, and assessment design, while Ryan brings a wealth of practical insight from working with schools to implement AI in authentic and responsible ways. Together they will share examples of how AI is being used innovatively to enhance teaching and learning, alongside the dilemmas educators must grapple with.

Participants will unpack what it means to uphold academic integrity, embrace authenticity, and use thoughtful applications of AI that can help them design, adapt, and amplify teaching and learning—all while building a teacher toolkit that supports practice, enhances student engagement, and personalises learning experiences.

Dr Beth Chapman | Professor at University of Canberra

Dr Beth Chapman is a strategic educator and researcher whose work reimagines how teachers and systems engage with data, assessment, and generative AI. At the University of Canberra, she leads postgraduate program design with a focus on flexible, stackable, and future-ready pathways for teachers. Beth's research brings design thinking and strategic foresight into education, exploring how AI can be used authentically and ethically to enhance learning. She partners with schools, systems, and industry to create innovative professional learning ecosystems that bridge classroom practice, policy, and postgraduate study.

Ryall Elwell | Director of Digital Pedagogies and Online Safety Education

Ryan Elwell is a 20-year veteran of the classroom, teaching physics, engineering, and STEM in three countries before shifting to his current role as Director of Digital Education in the ACT. Ryan develops extensive programs and resources to support teachers, using his PhD studies to inform his work. With a passion for human-centered digital pedagogies, he brings a focus on connecting people to Google tools and Artificial Intelligence in ways that amplify teaching practice. Ryan works to reveal innovative uses of technology to improve accessibility and equity, supports ethical and safe integration of tech into classrooms, and builds connections to accomplish shared goals.

A multiple international and national teaching award winner, he is Professor of Educational Technologies at the University of Sydney where he co-chairs the University's AI in Education working group and leads the Cogniti.ai initiative that puts educators in the driver's seat of AI.

Lee is an experienced educator and advocate for innovative teaching practices, specialising in the integration of AI in education. She is a passionate educator with 23 years' experience across a variety of sectors and in three countries. As the Prompt Engineer and AI Advocacy Project Officer at CEnet, Lee has helped lead the rollout of the cechat tool, collaborating with educators and tech designers to enhance classroom and organisational practices.
